### **Judging based on the OAAS Ontario Fairs Agriculture and Horticultural Judging Standards for Ontario Fairs~ Revised 2013**

1. Entry tags must be firmly attached on the items being exhibited. The tag must be complete with full name and exhibitor number.
2. Vegetables to be cleaned but not washed. A nylon stocking or soft cloth may be used for cleaning. Onions must be cleaned, but not peeled, except for jagged and dirty outer scales. Remove roots just below the bulb.
3. All smaller vegetables are to be shown on a sturdy plastic or paper plate. Not required for larger items as squash and cabbage
4. Please ensure that your entries match the description indicated beside each item i.e. quantity or sizing and stem length.
5. In cases of multiples, the judge is looking for uniformity of colour, shape and size and free of blemishes.
6. In the event of only one entry in a section, the judge has the power to withhold a 1st place award and, recommend it for only a 2nd or 3rd.

1. Cabbage, largest head
2. Cucumber, 5 pickling, 2"-4" long with short stem
3. Cucumber, 3 regular slicing, 6" length & over with short stem
4. Cucumber, 3 English, 6" length & over with short stem
5. Sweet peppers, 3, 1/2"-1" stem
6. Carrots, 5 short, 2"-4" length, no visible side roots, 1"-2" green top
7. Carrots, 5 long, over 4", no visible side roots, 1/2"-1" green top
8. Beets, 5 table, 1/2"-1" top
9. Squash, 1 Acorn pepper, short stem (should be all green)
10. Squash, 1 Butternut, short stem
11. Squash, 1 Buttercup, short stem
12. Squash, 1 any other variety, short stem
13. Squash, largest edible
14. Tomatoes, 5 red or yellow, stems on
15. Tomato, 1 large, red or yellow, stem on
16. Tomato, 1 largest green, stem on
17. Tomatoes, 10 Cherry, red or yellow, stems on
18. Garlic, 3 bulbs, 1" top
19. Corn, 5 ears for table use, 1/3 of husk removed, from the top down
20. Onion, 3 yellow, 1/2"-1" stem
21. Onions, 3 white, 1/2"-1" stem

22. Onions, 3 red, 1/2"-1" stem
  23. Onion, 1 largest, 1/2"-1" stem
  24. Onions, 3 Spanish, 1/2"-1" stem
  25. Eggplant, 1
  26. Beans, 5 green or yellow with short stem and tip attached
  27. Leeks, 3, 5"-6" top
  28. Zucchini, 2 small, 5"-7", short stem
  29. Pie pumpkin, 1, short stem
  30. Potatoes, 5 White
  31. Potatoes, 5 Yellow Flesh
  32. Potatoes, 5 Chieftain
  33. Display of a minimum of 4 ornamental gourds on a plate, stems attached
